Handout – Section 28

Section 28 (s 28) of the *Copyright Act 1968* allows copyright material to be performed and communicated as part of educational instruction.

Who can rely on s 28?

Teachers and students can rely on s 28:

- in the course of giving not-for-profit educational instruction
- if people in the audience are involved in giving or receiving educational instruction.

Generally lecturers and teachers from state training providers, TAFEs, schools and some registered training organisations (RTOs) qualify.

Activities covered by s 28

- showing commercial DVDs
- playing a CD
- displaying material using an interactive whiteboard, learning management system, wiki, blog or intranet
- **streaming** videos from YouTube
- linking to websites to display content
- reading poetry to a virtual class using Skype
- streaming DVDs in a content management system.

Warning!

- S 28 does not allow you to download or copy content.
- You cannot use illegal copies of DVDs (for example, no Bali DVDs or bootleg copies).
